All four Gospels present Jesus as "the Anointed One" who had come to demonstrate by word and action "good news to the poor, proclaim liberty to the captives, new sight to the blind, to set the down trodden free and to proclaim the Lord's time of jubilee (Luke 4:16 - 22)". This constitutes the **mission** of Jesus and the divine prescription and action for healing, restoration and wholeness. At the center of humanity, dislocation and alienation from God, creation and self is the heart, which is the nerve of decision making, emotion, thought, will and conviction. It is from head that we love; it is from the heart that we make decisions; it is from the heart that we give of self.

The heart reflects whether we are in good or poor emotional health. Do we have a caring heart, a heart of love, a heart of compassion, a soft heart or a patient heart for the Lord? These descriptions of our hearts also indicate our spiritual health, according to the book of Revelation. Do we have a warm heart, a cold heart, a luke-warm heart or a heart of fire? It is the desires of the heart that distorts our relationship with God and everyone else. The general confession of Morning and Evening Prayer of the 1662 Book of Common Prayer states in part," We have followed too much the devices and desires of our own heart" (BCP page 43& 59). Jesus emphasized that "it is from within the heart that evil intentions come..." (Mark 7: 21) and He proceeded to list twelve devices of the human heart that disconnect us from God, as God remains available to us. The attitude of the heart reflects its condition and intention; it is a broken and contrite heart which will always attract God's attention. Matthew 5:8 asserts, "Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God", in other words, the humble, penitent and contrite heart enables us to experience the love, forgiveness, patience and compassion of the heart of God.

The crucified Lord is the Wounded Healer, the one who heals us of our infirmities by forgiving our sins and transgressions. Healing is described as the miracle of God's Grace. It is God who meets us at our point of need, through Jesus Christ, by the anointing of the Holy Spirit, to make healing a life transforming encounter. The therapeutic team is the Triune God of Father, Son and Holy Spirit working for the healing of our hearts to make us whole in body, mind and spirit.

Focus for the month of September:"The Ministry of Healing and Anointing"

Healing may be defined as the ability of an individual to be once again restored to a state of good health. This healing can be experienced through various forms, and may include anointing of the sick, the Holy Communion and even through the ministry of our doctors and other medical personnel.

The sacrament of Holy Unction is an important sacrament used in the church, to carry out the healing of individuals. Many persons have been restored to good health by its use, all because of them receiving an outpouring of God's grace on their lives. A grace which God gives to all people so that we can live healthy lives and live them to the fullest.

In focusing today on anointing the sick, (otherwise referred to as Holy Unction), it is regarded as one of the seven sacraments of the church, in which the sick is anointed by the priest and the sign of the cross is made on the individual's head or other body parts, using consecrated oil. Through such actions being performed, the *Book of Common Prayer* reminds us that God's grace is given to us via such means for healing of the spirit, mind and body.

This practice is justified by James 5:14-15, which states "Is anyone among you sick? Then he must call for the elders (translated presbyter from the original Greek) of the church and they are to pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord; and the prayer offered in faith will restore the one who is sick, and the Lord will raise him up, and if he has committed sins, they will be forgiven him."

With the anointing of oil and prayer by a priest, the grace and healing power of God is affirmed and transmitted to the recipient. This is the outward and visible sign - anointing and prayer with the sign of the cross; and the inward and spiritual grace is the healing power of God who forgives our sins, enlighten our minds and strengthen our will to know the healing power of God. Through this Holy anointing may the Lord in His love and mercy uphold you by the grace and power of the Holy Spirit. Amen." BCP page 347.

In the ministry of healing, we seek to be transformed and that wholeness may be ours so that the Holy Spirit may strengthen us to constantly know and do God's will for the reign of God's Kingdom.
